

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Switching to OxfordAQA International GCSE Geography (9230)

OxfordAQA International GCSE Geography is a globally relevant specification which includes the study of climate change and environmental sustainability, with an emphasis on fieldwork to help develop students' data and analytical skills.

Teachers will find the specification an ideal vehicle to make International GCSE Geography enjoyable and provide the right level of challenge. It allows a freedom to teach geography in a variety of ways and incorporates key themes and concepts throughout. It is the perfect platform to progress to A-level study.

Key features:

- Explores the interactions between the man-made and natural worlds, including the crucially important global mega trends of climate change, population change and resource provision.
- The breakdown of content into three papers covering physical geography, human geography and fieldwork ensures smooth progression from GCSE to A-level.
- Content is designed to be of particular interest to students in the Middle East and Asia, with opportunities for local fieldwork to enrich students understanding.

Changes from November 2021

We would like to remind you about an update to the International GCSE Geography (9230) specification.

We made changes to simplify the structure and improve the clarity of the specification.

We listened to feedback from our teachers that suggested that we could make the fieldwork

requirements for this subject easier to deliver to students, if we made some changes to our assessment.

We also took the opportunity to improve the clarity of the fieldwork requirements and details of

how it is assessed in the specification. Please be assured that there are no changes to the fieldwork requirements.

We also introduced an amended assessment structure for Paper 3.

What were the changes to paper 3?

- * Geographical and Fieldwork skills is broken down into three sections rather than two:
- Section A: Geographical skills
- Section B: Fieldwork skills (unfamiliar contexts)
- Section C: Individual fieldwork enquiry

This helps students to understand where their geographical skills, fieldwork skills in unfamiliar contexts and their individual fieldwork enquiry are being assessed in this paper. The paper was renamed 'Geographical and Fieldwork skills' to reflect this change.

The total mark for Paper 3 was reduced to 60 marks. This means the paper contributes slightly less to the overall assessment, giving slightly more weight to the longer Papers 1 and 2.

- Paper 1: Living with the physical environment - 36%
- Paper 2: Challenges in the human environment - 36%
- Paper 3: Geographical and Fieldwork skills - 28%

Papers 1 and 2 have not changed and geographical skills are still be tested across all three exam papers.

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3.2 Challenges in the human er	nvironment	
3.2.1 Urban issues and challenges	The first OxfordAQA key idea on urbanisation is covered in the first section of Section A, Topic 6 Urban environments. There is some reference to the content relating to the second OxfordAQA key idea on opportunities and challenges for cities in Lower income countries (LICs) and Newly emerging economies (NEEs) in the final part of the content linked to the second key idea in Section A, Topic 6 Urban environments. The second section of the content here considers a small part (with regard to multinational nature) of the world cities section. There is also some reference to this aspect in the third key idea on changes in cities in HIC's. However, much of the relevant content linking to areas of Asia and Africa is not covered.	The first OxfordAQA key idea on urbanisation is covered in Theme 1 as 1.7 Urbanisation. This also considers squatter settlements, which is a part of the second key idea. There is some coverage of the world cities section in Theme 1 as 1.6 Urban settlements with regard to the challenges. However, much of the relevant content linking to areas of Asia and Africa is not covered.
3.2.2 The changing economic world	There is some reference to the first OxfordAQA key idea on global variations in economic development in the first section of Section A, Topic 4 Economic activity and energy. This is addressed in more detail on Section C, Topic 9 Development and human welfare. The strategies to reduce the development gap given in the second OxfordAQA key idea are covered in Section C, Topic 9 Development and human welfare in the last part of the content. There is some reference to the third OxfordAQA key idea in the first section (with regard to classification of employment) and in the second section (with regard to Trans-national corporations (TNCs)) of Section A Topic 4 Economic activity and energy. TNCs are considered in more detail in Section C Topic 8 Globalisation and migration in the first section of the content.	There is reference to the first OxfordAQA key idea in Theme 3 as 3.1 Development. There is reference to the classification of employment here and TNCs with some links to the second OxfordAQA key idea.

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3.2.3.1 Water and 3.2.3.2 energy resources (optional)	There is some reference to water supply and shortage and surplus in Section A, Topic 1 River environments, in the third section with some link to the first OxfordAQA key idea. However, this addresses a predominantly local scale, with some reference to global, rather than the global and national scale (linked to LIC or NEE) of the OxfordAQA content. There is also a small reference to water resources as part of the first key idea in Section A, Topic 5 Rural environments.	as 3.6 Water. However, the global scale is not emphasised as in the OxfordAQA content. Some strategies to overcome shortages are covered here, linking to part of the second OxfordAQA key idea. There is some reference to the importance of renewable and non-renewable sources of energy in this section
	There is some reference to the rise in global demand for energy in Section A Topic 4 Economic activity and energy (final section) linking to the first key idea of the OxfordAQA content.	
	The renewable and non-renewable energy resources section here links with the second key idea of the OxfordAQA content. There is also a small reference to energy resources as part of the first key idea in Section A, Topic 5 Rural environments.	

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3.2.3.3 Population change and 3.2.3.4 communication (optional)	The first key idea of the OxfordAQA content on population is partly addressed in the final section of Section C, Topic 9 Development and human welfare, whilst the second OxfordAQA key idea on population (migration) is considered in the final section of Section C, Topic 8 Globalisation and migration. The relationship between population and resources is also considered in Section A, Topic 4 Economic activity and energy. The relevant first key idea on communication of the OxfordAQA content is not covered. There are some elements of the second one that are covered such as links to trade, information technologies and tourism in the first two parts of Section C Topic 8 Globalisation and migration.	The first key idea of the OxfordAQA content on population is partly addressed in Theme 1 as 1.1 Population dynamics. The second OxfordAQA key idea is partly addressed in Theme 1 as 1.2 Migration, although there is not always an international focus. The relevant first key idea on communication of the OxfordAQA content is not covered. There are some elements of the second one that are covered although there is a significantly different emphasis such as in Theme 3 with tourism being covered in 3.4.
