General note:

OxfordAQA International GCSE in Pakistan Studies is a linear qualification with both examinations to be completed at the end of the course and in the same series sessions. The specification offers a topic-based approach, emphasizing optionality and active enquiry and research into the history and development of, and contemporary issues facing, Pakistan up to 2022. The consideration of themes such as democracy and equality in contemporary Pakistan, the role and influence of women in Pakistan, the challenges facing Pakistan in a globalized world and the issue of sustainability as it impacts on modern day Pakistan make this OxfordAQA specification unique, contemporary, and exciting to students with an interest in understanding Pakistan's current position, and how it came to occupy that position on the world stage.
